Education

Our education initiatives focussed on improving access, learning outcomes and student retention across communities. During the year, we supported digital learning, school infrastructure development, scholarships, study kits, STEM education, community learning centres, teacher capacity building and school support programmes. We also continued initiatives such as Digi Classrooms, learning resource distribution, academic coaching, volunteer-led learning, coding without computers, talent hunts, science exhibitions, yoga and sports activities, Mini Science Centres, kitchen gardens and Anganwadi support to promote holistic development.

Community health

Our community health programmes strengthened access to preventive, primary and diagnostic healthcare across operating locations. Key interventions included mobile health camps, rural healthcare programmes, primary healthcare support, maternal and child health services, TB nutrition support, disease prevention, health awareness, ambulance services and diagnostic facilities. The programmes also covered eye care, adolescent health, menstrual hygiene, maternal education, vector-borne disease control, HIV/AIDS awareness, Anganwadi support and healthcare infrastructure strengthening at community health centres and primary health facilities.

Livelihood and income generation

Our livelihood initiatives focussed on skill development, enterprise creation and income enhancement. During the year, we supported women entrepreneurship, youth training, farmer producer organisations, agriculture and allied activities, irrigation support, mushroom cultivation, tailoring, handicrafts, livestock development and market linkages. The programmes also promoted SHG-led enterprises, jute products, screen printing, beautician training, bag making, fisheries, poultry, duck rearing, high-value vegetable cultivation, farmer field schools, farm ponds, biogas units, sapling distribution, livestock vaccination, vermi-composting, fishery demonstrations, water harvesting structures and climate-resilient agriculture.

Rural development

Our rural development projects focused on access to essential services, community infrastructure and quality of life. Key initiatives included drinking water systems, purified drinking water plants, roads, drainage, solar street lights, water conservation structures, sanitation facilities, plantation drives and community assets. We also supported school renovation, boundary walls, mid-day meal sheds, tube wells, solar-based water infrastructure, canal renovation, community halls, community centres, toilets, cultural preservation activities, welfare scheme facilitation and cleanliness campaigns.

Rural Development details: Key rural development projects included drinking water systems, purified drinking water plants, roads, drainage, solar street lights, community infrastructure, water conservation structures, sanitation facilities, plantation drives, and community assets. These initiatives benefited over 2,88,000 people, improving access to basic services, rural connectivity, water security, and community well-being.

Access to justice

Under the Access to Justice initiative, we worked to prevent child marriage and child exploitation through awareness, stakeholder sensitisation and community mobilisation. The programme focussed on building community vigilance, encouraging pledges against child marriage, strengthening awareness around child rights and enabling timely intervention in vulnerable cases. The initiative also supported education continuity for affected children and promoted youth participation through community platforms.

Supplier engagement

We continued to strengthen responsible sourcing through long-term and collaborative partnerships with local Indian businesses, service providers, material suppliers, manpower partners and international suppliers of equipment and raw materials. Our Supplier Code of Conduct sets expectations on compliance management, environmental responsibility, human rights, labour rights and business ethics. All suppliers, including new suppliers, are required to comply with the Code.

We review supplier engagement practices and contractual obligations to reinforce compliance with ESG expectations. Our supplier assessment framework covers country-specific risks, commodity and sector-specific considerations and ESG performance criteria. Supplier ESG assessment is part of our CO-CREATE Sustainability Strategy and is reviewed by top management and the Board Committee. We also conducted training and awareness programmes for internal stakeholders to improve accountability and support supplier ESG initiatives.
